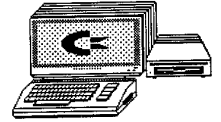

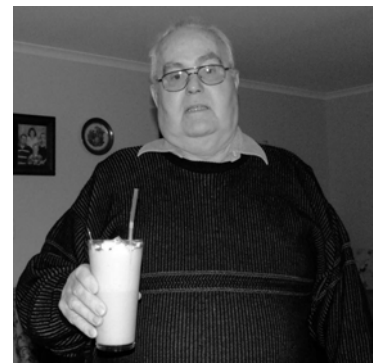

How do I get into safe mode?

How do you get into Safe Mode? Very easily. When booting your system, as soon as the first (POST) screen appears showing your memory and hardware information, start pressing 'F8.'

The Windows XP advanced options menu will come up listing various boot options. As you can see, there are a few safe mode options available. 'Safe Mode' is the one we are interested in for now. 'Safe mode with networking' allows you to connect to other computers via a network, and also allows you Internet access if you are using an Internet sharing device connected to your network. Note that dial up connections like DSL will not work directly in safe mode. 'Safe mode with command prompt' does not attempt to load the Windows Explorer graphical interface, instead transporting you straight to XP's DOS-like command prompt.

Why should you remember all this?

Because safe mode is the single best thing to try if you are experiencing problems booting your system or if running certain software causes problems. Using safe mode can let you determine if the problems you are experiencing are hardware malfunctions or software issues.

Safe mode works by providing the minimal set of software needed to boot you into the Windows Graphic environment. So, if you can boot in safe mode but cannot boot properly into the normal Windows environment, you have a problem with some of the software or a device driver installed on your system. Safe mode also provides you with access to the tools you need to resolve these kinds of problems.

XP Home safe mode - some differences

The Windows XP Home safe mode is fundamentally identical to the one in Windows XP Pro, with a couple of notable changes. In Windows XP Home, the built-in 'administrator' account is only available in safe mode and is the default account for that mode. The password for the administrator account is blank, since it is not accessible except in safe mode. It's recommended that you log in as this account to make changes in safe mode.

The fact that the administrator password is blank by default also allows you to use XP Home's safe mode to reset the password of other user accounts on your machine in the event that you lose the original password. Of course, this also means that every user account on your system is vulnerable to someone with direct access to the system, which is why XP Home is intended for non-business use only.

Practical uses for safe mode

Now let's explore some of the uses that safe mode has on the average Windows XP desktop. There's a reason why attempting to boot in safe mode is the first thing any tech will do when confronted with a PC that will not boot fully into Windows.

Removing viruses/spyware

Often the only way to correctly remove certain persistent virus and spyware programs is to run your system in safe mode. Many forms of malicious software will protect or reinstall themselves constantly if they are allowed to start in the first place. These programs will situate themselves in one of the many autorun locations in the Windows XP registry and file structure, so when Windows is started normally, so is the offending software, running as a process in the background.

When you start the PC in safe mode, these autorun locations are not used, and no software is started automatically. This can allow virus and spyware removal programs the opportunity they need to correctly and completely remove the malicious software.

If you are having virus or spyware problems on your PC, you should always run antivirus and anti-spyware programs in *safe mode* to ensure that they have maximum effect.

What happens when your PC is powered on?

When your PC is powered on a sequence called the bootstrap is run. It occurs in two steps, Power-On Self Test and Operating System Load.

Power-On Self Test (POST) is a series of tests to make certain that necessary is present and properly operating.

- ◆ First the Central Processing Unit (CPU) is reset. The CPU checks itself and the POST program stored in the BIOS memory.
- ◆ Then the CPU begins using the code located in BIOS to check components in the PC. The RAM is tested by writing and reading back every byte to ensure proper operation.
- ◆ The Keyboard is checked for attachment and to see if any key has been pressed. Pushing certain keys during boot up tells the CPU you want to modify the BIOS code. You would want to do this if a new piece of hardware has been added and you need to set up BIOS to talk to it.
- ◆ The Floppy and Hard Drives are checked to make sure they are present. The Mouse is also checked to make sure it is attached. Finally, the test results are compared to the configuration data in the BIOS.
- ◆ Any mismatches causes the POST to fail and an error message appears on the display.

Operating System Load - After the POST is successfully completed the CPU searches Storage devices for special files that indicate the beginning of the OS and then loads it into memory. The sequence in which the storage devices are searched is part of the configuration set-up stored in BIOS.

Once the Operating System (OS) is located, the CPU copies what's called the 'boot record' from the OS into DRAM. Control is then passed to the 'boot record' in DRAM, which then continues loading the rest of the OS.

This process continues until the OS load is completed. When the OS load is completed the Desktop appears in the display and waits for you, the user, to tell it what you want it to do.

MOZILLA INTERNET BROWSER AND MOZILLA EMAIL; A MICROSOFT ALTERNATIVE

Microsoft with their Windows family of operating systems for PC has long had the advantage of integration for the Internet and Email software. By default, when Windows is installed on a PC, Internet Explorer and Outlook Express are automatically installed. Therefore, most people use these two for their Internet Browsing and for Email.

IE6 is the most common Internet Browser and it is because of this, hackers, Ad-ware and back door intrusive software is a continuous problem as the originators of those intrusive software target Microsoft and the users of their products.

Mozilla Firefox is an alternative to IE and the companion program, **Mozilla Thunderbird** is an option for Emailing. Both originated years ago and when Netscape ceased to develop Browsers, Mozilla used that as a platform to continue to offer something different for PC owners. Mozilla operate under the "Open-source" software development schemes.

Both Firefox and Thunderbird will load onto your PC and work happily alongside IE and Outlook Express. Both import the settings, favourites and mailboxes from the Microsoft products. You can see that there is a great similarity between Microsoft and Mozilla so changing from one to the other is easy and using them is intuitive.

Most users of Mozilla quickly gained confidence and find that they can more easily block pop-ups, are less of a target to hackers and virus program writers. Both can be uninstalled and then revert to MS IE and Outlook Express if you wish. However, there is no problem leaving them there if you have the room. Unlike different Anti-virus programs, these do not conflict.

Search Google for lots of information about Mozilla Firefox (Browser) and Thunderbird (Emailing) and to find sites for downloading the latest versions. Just about the only thing that Mozilla won't do is to allow you to browse Microsoft sites. For some reason, MS block Mozilla

PC magazines usually have the programs on the cover CDs but by downloading, you get the latest versions. Firefox has a great help for Internet Explorer Users and Thunderbird looks and "feels" like Express. Have a look and consider giving Mozilla a go.
